A Word from the Dean

"Things are never so bad that they can't keep getting worse"

Although others might dispute the claim, my first exposure to the above quote came out of the mouth of Garrison Keillor, as relayed from what he heard out of the mouths of some of the Norwegian bachelor farmers who lived around Lake Wobegon.

The source of the quote isn't the point, however, as much as the sentiment it expresses. Such a dour outlook on life could also be found in the character of Eeyore in "Winnie the Pooh". But a similar outlook can lurk within any of us. Just a couple issues ago, I mentioned how perplexing the weather can be as it so significantly impacts the lives of so many in our Mission District. And there are still people living among us who can recall, with vivid recall, year after year of drought that would force families to pull up stakes and hope to find better conditions elsewhere. As I sit at my desk on this Wednesday, the promise of rain again fills the forecast, with as much as two inches in the next 48 hours tantalizingly suggested. But as recently as just a few days ago, a forecast of nearly an inch and a half ended up as little more than a third of an inch.

It's enough to help me feel a bit sympathetic for the people Israel as they began their trek to the Promised Land. In the book of Exodus, we read of the great exultation they felt at seeing Pharaoh's army vanquished by God in the waters of the Red Sea. This was very

soon after, with plague after plague, God showed Egypt, Pharaoh, and even God's people, that God alone was God. But even with these fantastic events branded into their minds, it took only three days of wandering in the wilderness before those their songs of praise turned to grumbling. I could sympathize with their plight. I can understand what it feels like to begin to feel doubt creep back in.

Of course, God acted on behalf of His people, turning the bitter water of Marah into sweet. And, of course, God will act in our day, bringing showers and showers of water to replenish the parched land, even if we have to wait and worry a bit longer.

The old saw says it this way, "Everybody complains about the weather, but nobody does anything about it." The fact is that the weather, like most everything else in our life, is outside of our control. And so, we are faced with a choice. We can worry and grumble, or we can trust and give thanks. The default mode for most of us is worry. But through these trying times, what God tries to teach us is trust. And so, may we give thanks, no matter the circumstance, for it is God in Whom we trust.

So, will things get worse before they get better? Maybe. Will things get much, much worse? Perhaps. Will things get better? Better even than we can imagine!

Solus Christus—Christ Alone

We are a blessed people!

The writer to the Ephesians 1:7 reminds us: "In him we have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of sins, in accordance to the riches of God's grace."

"For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life. For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world through him." John 3:16-17 NIV

Paul reminds us also of something very important: "What you heard from me, keep as the pattern of sound teaching, with faith and love in Christ Jesus." 2 Timothy 1:13 NIV

Yes, we indeed are a blessed people! It is in Christ alone that our hope is found. Again looking at the apostle Paul we see that he said so many different things about Christ, for example in 1 Corinthians 2:2: "I resolved to know nothing (while I was with you) except Jesus Christ and him crucified." Paul's sole purpose was to make known the very simple fact that it was Christ alone who is the Savior that suffered and died for sinners. In essence what Paul is reminding us of is that Jesus Christ, the perfect son of God, offered His body as a perfect sacrifice for sinners. Upon the cross He took the sins upon Himself, and for once and for all paid the price with the penalty our sins deserved.

A commentary written by James Boice talks about Christ alone in these words: "The reformers taught that salvation is by and through the work of Jesus Christ only, which is what this slogan solus Christus refers to. It means that (through the cross and the empty tomb) Jesus has done it all so that now no merit on the part of man, no merit of the saints, no works of ours performed either here or in purgatory can add to his completed saving work."

Yes, we are a blessed people, and we are called to praise Christ for His saving work on the cross, because we are then giving glory to our God. Since we are saved by Christ alone, and not by ourselves, all the honor and glory of our salvation returns to God and to Him alone.

I have found the following, relatively new, praise hymn or song personally meaningful to me. Written by Keith Getty and Stuart Townsend from the United Kingdom, the music and words convey where our true hope is found in this life and forever:

"In Christ alone my hope is found,
He is my light, my strength, my song;
This Cornerstone, this solid Ground,
Firm through the fiercest drought and storm.
What heights of love, what depths of peace,
When fears are stilled, when strivings cease!
My Comforter, my All in All,
Here in the love of Christ I stand...."

A Few of My Favorite Psalms Psalm 27

We live in uncertain times. With a year of COVID restrictions behind us, we know we are still not "out of the woods", since the vaccine has been in use for only a few months, and the length of time it will protect us—or whether it will protect from new varieties of COVID—is still unknown. Each day the news media report social and political unrest, with communities splintering over every issue imaginable, and seemingly endless criminal activity. In our own lives, we may be dealing with serious, even lifethreatening, illness or depression. Perhaps there are financial stressors or tense personal relationships that weigh heavily on your mind and heart. Many would say, with good reason, that we are living in dark times.

Whenever possible, I avoid listening to—or reading about—the current unrest and news. I tell folks that instead of reading the newspaper I read the prophets—Old Testament prophets, that is. It's amazing how many parallels there are in our current events and the happenings in the ancient world. Political systems have changed, and we have much more sophisticated technology, but the human heart is the same as it has always been. People still cheat, kill, oppress and try to justify their every whim and sin. The words of judgment proclaimed by Isaiah and Jeremiah; Ezekiel and Amos, apply as much to our world as it did to theirs.

What is also true, is that the words of lament, anxiety, and comfort in the Psalms also speak as clearly to us as they did to the ancient people of God. One of the Psalms that speaks clearly to me when the world feels dark, when my life feels like it's spinning out of control, and when news about all the turmoil going on in the world around me becomes oppressive, is Psalm 27: "The Lord is my light and my salvation; whom shall I fear? The Lord is the stronghold of my life; of whom shall I be afraid?" These opening words of the Psalm remind me to turn around and focus on the Giver and Redeemer of life—on Jesus, the Light of the world. Just like Peter trying to walk toward Jesus on the water, I too often look downward at the dark waves of life trying to pull me down into death. But looking up at Jesus, I can remember His

promises and words of encouragement to Peter and to the other disciples—"O man of little faith, why did you doubt?" (Matthew 14:31b) "Why are you afraid? Have you no faith?" (Mark 4:40) I have lived more that my three score and ten years, and the Lord has always loved and carried me through every illness, struggle and danger. His timing is perfect, His strength is more than sufficient, and His love is steadfast and firm.

The psalmist goes on to recount the many dangers and ills that threaten him but returns to words of faith in verses 4 and 5: "One thing have I asked of the Lord, that will I seek after; that I may dwell in the house of the Lord all the days of my life, to behold the beauty of the Lord, and to inquire in his temple. For he will hide me in his shelter in the day of trouble; he will conceal me under the cover of his tent, he will set me high upon a rock." The Holy Scriptures never promise us a life of continual ease or comfort. But unlike those without faith, we have the promise of eternal life with the Lord, and the constant protection and comfort of the Lord as we walk through the darkest valleys of this life.

After more prayers of thanksgiving for the Lord's help, and pleas for enlightenment and protection, the psalmist ends with these strong words of affirmation and trust: I believe that I shall see the goodness of the Lord in the land of the living! Wait for the Lord; be strong, and let your heart take courage; vea, wait for the Lord!" Jesus' words to the disciples in John 15, "Abide in me...." always come to mind when I am instructed to wait for the Lord. Abiding requires patience and steadfastness. This is what the psalmist is talking about. His words remind us that we are not alone in the dark. But we must hold fast to the Lord. keep our focus on Jesus, and wait for Him wait for His perfect timing.

The 2021 annual Convocation of the Iowa Mission District will take place at Emmons Lutheran Church, Emmons, on Saturday, September 11. Our theme is "Christ Alone" and we are pleased to have Bishop Dan Selbo as our keynote speaker. The Convocation is our opportunity to gather as brothers and sisters in Christ for the purpose of fellowship, worship, learning and sharing of ideas and to hear up-dates on the work and mission of the NALC. We also will have a business session to conduct the necessary business of the District. As you prepare for the convocation please be thinking of nominations for Treasurer of the Mission District and the following Council positions: Two lay members (one 3 year and one 2 year to finish an uncompleted term) and one clergy (3 year).
